New Zealand will have a firearms registry from 24 June 2023. From this date, firearms licence holders will be required to provide information about their arms items.

Firearms Registry - register online or over the phone

The Registry is one of the ways we're strengthening how we manage firearms in New Zealand. Firearms licence holders will be required to provide information about their arms items.

From 24 June 2023, there will be two ways to register your arms items.

- Online: The fastest and easiest way is through our website using MyFirearms and available to use 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- Over the phone: You'll also be able to provide information by calling our Registry and Services team. We will be open Monday to Friday from 8.30am to 5.00pm.

You will not be charged a fee to register your arms items.




Licence applications update

Staff across Te Tari Pūreke have been working hard to reduce the number of historical firearms applications we have on hand.

Our 'historical firearms applications' come from a project initiated in 2022. At this time, all applications that were over 120 days old were ring-fenced and given to a dedicated team to work on. Meanwhile, our district-based firearms licensing staff continued processing all other applications.

In July 2022 we had 5,158 historical files. At the end of March 2023, 9 months later, we had completed 4697 files, a 91% reduction.



Getting into the heartland

Rural firearms owners in the Waikato were the first to get targeted safety stories in their local newspaper – Te Kowhai News. Just in time for the 'Roar' and game bird seasons.

Te Kowhai News published a significant firearms safety article in late March. Since then, the same article has been published in local and rural papers across the motu – 56 papers in all. This amounts to over 1 million printed papers with a reach (eyes on the papers) of over twice that. The article also
